Events ranging from cupcake decorating to creating our very own Escape the Room allowed Stevens students to be engaged with the Greek Community. Cupcake Wars, a co-hosted event with Sigma Delta Tau, had participants compete in pairs where one person would decorate a cupcake, and their partner had to recreate the exact design but blindfolded! Overall, the event ended up raising over \$150 for Prevent Child Abuse America, one of Sigma Delta Tau's philanthropies. With the strong showing of brothers and sisters, the event was a huge success.

Sig Ep NJA has participated in other events hosted by other Greek organizations, such as Fraternity Family Feud hosted by Theta Phi Alpha, StevensTHON hosted by Stevens itself, and Castle Point King (CPK) hosted by Delta Phi Epsilon. CPK is an annual event where a common theme is decided upon and participating fraternities put on a performance that depicts the chosen theme. With this year's theme being powerful woman, Daniel Lum's astounding performance of Mulan in CPK impressed the crowd with his unique bo staff scene.




